As he walked in, the school started to sing the New Zealand national Anthem accompanied by the brass band. He mentioned later that he thought all the girls sang the national anthem beautifully both in Maori and English. A special thank you must go out to Stephan who taught and practiced for weeks with everyone – well done Stefan! Once on stage the President gave a speech which was translated by Miyu from the 3F class and everyone thought that she sounded just like a native speaker. After that, the Prime Minister spoke about the differences in education between New Zealand and Japan – we also found out that he has two gifted children – one of them is residing in France for a year studying at a French High School at the moment. Another thing he mentioned was that he likes to cook Japanese Katsudon! After that the 1F class gave a dance performance which was very entertaining and I'm sure everyone enjoyed it. Then came the Calligraphy club making a very impressive painting displaying the friendship between New Zealand and Japan.

St. Patrick's Day is March 17th and it is the National Feast Day of Ireland.

Thanksgiving is a holiday in the USA and Canada when people give thanks. It is celebrated every year on the fourth Thursday of November in the USA and on the second Monday of October in Canada. So, this year it is November 26th in the USA, and was October 12th in Canada.

The first Thanksgiving took place a year after a group of English people, called the Pilgrims, moved to the north coast of America, near New York, in 1620. So the next year, when the Pilgrims had grown lots of food, they had a huge dinner party with the Native Americans who had helped them. Everyone had more food to eat than they needed and were very thankful to each other for friendship and good fortune.

These days, families get together on Thanksgiving Day, perhaps at the grandparents' house, and have a big dinner. Many families watch college football together on this day as well.
