In NZ, KGGS students join social studies classes with their Kiwi classmates. These classes are very different from history classes in Japan. In this column we will showcase some of the work KGGS students do in NZ.

Dear Anne,

Hello. My name is Yurari Ikeda. Nice to meet you. Let me introduce myself. I'm a 16 year old half Brazilian, half Japanese girl. I came to NZ to study abroad. I am learning about you in social studies.

I'm living in the year 2014. We have many useful things. For example, we have the internet, which has so much information on everything. Many people use social networks. If we use these, we can have a conversation with anyone in the world.

We have learned from the experiences of your family and other Jewish people about how awful war is. It makes people fearful. Your diary shows the horrors of war. I think you were so brave. You are covered in glory. Your diary told us the terrors of war. I think it was a very terrible two years when you were hiding in the house. You had to be quiet every day, and you didn't know when your enemy would come for you. Your experiences teach us that we must on no account have wars. We can't get anything from war. I would like to thank you for teaching me that war is wrong.

World War Two finished in 1945. It was much more peaceful after the war, but we still have wars in some countries. People still have wars because of religion, colour prejudice and discrimination. It is really sad. I hate war. I hope that there will be a world without war someday.
