# Study Abroad Course News

## Remembering an Important Day in NZ and Australia's Past

ANZAC Day (アンザック・デイとは何でしょう?)

100 years have passed since the ANZAC soldiers landed at Gallipoli Cove. On April 25, I went to the Memorial Park in Hamilton to attend a public service for ANZAC Day. There were lots of people and there was a big memorial cenotaph for people who died in World War One and Two. ANZAC Day is a national holiday observed only in Australia and New Zealand, so I have a very good experience there. I wondered why Australians and New Zealanders have a day like this, and I tried to find out. The following are the results of my research. ANZAC is an abbreviation for "Australia and New Zealand Army Corps." ANZAC Day commemorates all Australians and New Zealanders who have served and died in all wars, conflicts, and peacekeeping operations. It is observed on 25 April each year, because it is the date that ANZAC soldiers landed at Gallipoli Cove in Turkey in 1915. At first, the day was for the soldiers who fought in the battle of Gallipoli. However, after World War Two, the day has been changed to be for all the people who served and died in all wars for their countries.

What happened at Gallipoli Cove? The Battle of Gallipoli took place between 25 April 1915 and 9 January 1916. The reason for the battles was to break a \*stalemate on the Western and Eastern fronts, and to help the Russians. Around 8,000 ANZAC soldiers died, and 18,000 ANZAC soldiers were wounded. It was a really big event for Australia and New Zealand. They made ANZAC Day in 1916 and the first dawn service was held in Sydney in 1927. After that the dawn service became a common form of ANZAC Day remembrance for Australians and New Zealanders during the 1920s. Most New Zealanders appreciate this ANZAC experience. Through mourning their dead they have developed their sense of having a national identity – being Kiwis instead of being a part of the British Empire! \*stalemate:膠着状態

Many of these girls have been practicing hard before and after school with their teachers to make sure that there are no surprises on the big day! We offer congratulations to the students who were able to pass the writing test and wish them the best of luck with the speaking test!
