
## 日本語版

Yukie spent three months in Auckland as a member of the first intake of our JHS Study Abroad Course. She is now a member of the KGGS Study Abroad Course and will spend 2018 in New Zealand. Yukie gave the following speech at a recent school event:

"I'm Yukie Omae. Today, I'd like to tell you about my short term study abroad and my dream.

First of all, I'm going to tell you about what I did and learned in New Zealand. The reasons why I joined this study abroad program are to improve my English abilities and to become independent from my parents. Before I went to New Zealand, I was worried about whether I could do things by myself or not. However, my host parents taught me how to do housework and then I did everything myself, like washing clothes, washing dishes, cleaning the house, and cooking. Now I know how, I can do these things in Japan, too. I also think that my listening ability become has better than before. At first in New Zealand, I couldn't understand what people were talking about, but after a couple of weeks, I could understand almost everything. I was happy when I could understand the contents of a conversation.

By the way, my host family members are all from India, so I had many opportunities to try new things. For example, I learned how to cook Indian meals, how to eat curry with own hands, and some Hindi words. These were all amazing experiences for me. What's more, my host family took me to lots of places. I especially remember the day which was the last day of my homestay. They took me to a restaurant secretly, and they said, "You are a member of this family, so you can come back to this house whenever you want." When I heard that, I felt so happy and I didn't want to leave them. I learned many things through this study abroad. The above experiences are ones that I will always treasure.

Next, I'm going tell you about my dream. Actually, I can't decide what I want to become concretely, but I can say that I would like to use English for my future job. What's more, I'm going to go to New Zealand next year for one year. To be successful in my study abroad and to achieve my dream, I need to study much more, and I'm really looking forward to learning new things."
